# FORT MITCHELL CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING AND PLANNING SESSION January 28, 2019

# CALL TO ORDER / PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE / ROLL CALL

Mayor Hehman called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m.

## APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

Mayor Hehman asked for a motion for approval of the Agenda.

Mr. Deatherage made a motion to approve the agenda. Ms. Nachazel offered a second to the motion. After asking for discussion or questions and hearing none, Mayor Hehman called for a voice vote. The motion carried by all ayes.

## CITIZENS AND GUESTS

Mayor Hehman stated that Lorissa, an American government class student from Dixie High school was there to observe. He asked if there were any other guests that wanted to speak.

Mike Doty, Jerry Royce and Mike Brandy from Brandicorp along with Debbie Hayes and Justin Hartfil from Christ Hospital presented the most current development plan for the Drawbridge property. The plan includes a 100 Room Hotel (Marriott or Hilton brand), two restaurants, 120 luxury apartments, a pocket park, the surgery center, a 24 hour Emergence Department and Medical Offices. There will be underground parking for the apartments, surgery center and Medical building. Mayor Hehman stated that Christ Hospital wishes to move forward with the development and based on what they have said a Certificate of Need was not needed for the emergency room. Debbi Hayes confirmed that one would not be needed. Bernie Wessel, owner of the Grace Court apartments said he is happy about the development, but is concerned about the road access for the apartments. Mr. Doty stated that Brandicorp would work with Mr. Wessels as well as Bayer Becker to make the traffic work.

The development would need four text amendments that Council would need to authorize. (1) Decrease parking requirements; (2) Allow Emergency Department as a permitted use, (3) Do not require retail under the residential and (4) Allow administrative review of the Stage two process instead of coming to Council. Ms. Reddy stated that Council will still make a final decision on the Stage one process but the Stage two process is basically submitting detailed drawings based on the Stage one. Allowing an administrative approval of the Stage two will make the process move faster. Mayor Hehman advised that the apartments are not in the Beechwood School District. Ms. Hayes advised that 95% of emergency room patients leave and only 5% are admitted to a hospital and it would be a 24 hour operation. Mr. Heidrich, developer of the area across Buttermilk and Chamber Center, would like a stoplight at Royal Drive and Buttermilk and the lights to be synchronized. He will reach out to start discussions.

Mayor Hehman stated that currently there is no development agreement with Brandicorp and this agreement is important going forward. He also said that the City continues to have concerns about the four way stop on the re-routed Royal Drive and will get an independent engineering firm to review that.
