CALL TO ORDER / ROLL CALL

Mayor Jude Hehman, called the regular council meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. and instructed everyone to stand for the Pledge of Allegiance.

ROLL CALL OF COUNCIL MEMBERS

Ms. Guenther called roll. The following council members were present: Mary Burns, Kim Nachazel, Greg Pohlgeers, Alyson Roeding, Jerry Deatherage, Michael Stoeckle, and Vicki Boerger. A quorum was present.

OTHER STAFF PRESENT

City Administrator, Edwin King; City Clerk/Treasurer, Amy Guenther; Police Chief, Andrew Schierberg; Fire Chief, Adam Fuller; Programs Coordinator, Joe Christofield; City Attorney, Claire Parsons, and Public Works Director, Nick Tewes.

APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

Mayor Hehman asked if there were any changes to the agenda and after hearing none, Mr. Pohlgeers made a motion to approve the agenda. Ms. Roeding seconded the motion. Mayor Hehman called for a voice vote. The motion carried by all ayes.

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES

Mayor Jude Hehman asked if there were any changes to the February 22, 2022, minutes. No changes were noted. Mr. Stoeckle made a motion to approve the minutes of the February 22, 2022, council meeting. Ms. Boerger seconded the motion. After asking for discussion and hearing none, Mayor Jude Hehman called for a voice vote. The motion carried with all ayes.

CITIZENS AND GUESTS-None

INTRODUCTION OF POLICE OFFICER JOE WOESTE

Chief Schierberg introduced Police Officer, Joe Woeste. Officer Woeste comes from the Airport Police Department, served on S.W.A.T., and has completed crisis intervention, bike patrol and field training.

AUDIT PRESENTATION

Stephanie Huhn from Bramley & Ackley CPA's reviewed the City's audit for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2021.

- The City received a clean and unmodified opinion.
- The General Fund balance increased \$249,000.
- The Park Tax Fund balance increased over \$1,154,169 due to a transfer from the General Fund for the renovation.

- The City's strong General Fund balance of \$9,696,558 is greater than six months of expenses.
- The Government Wide net position of all government activities was \$14,585,788 and the increase in the ending net position was \$222,646.
- Total revenues were \$10,008,924, expenditures were \$9,828,238. and the increase in the total for all funds was \$180,686.
- The net increase in capital assets was \$1,750,509
- All of the City's cash was FDIC insured or was fully collateralized. There were no investments as of June 30, 2021.
- The long term unfunded net pension and other post-employment benefits (OPEB) liability was \$11,742,283 and \$3,612,502. The Mayor
- The City received \$839,584 in Federal CARES money
- In the Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting and on Compliance there were no issues of material weaknesses or noncompliance.
- Ms. Huhn thanked City Clerk/Treasurer, Amy Guenther, for assisting with the audit.

CITY ATTORNEY'S REPORT

Ms. Parsons provided a first reading of **Ordinance 2022-04: Amending the Official Zoning Map for the City** and to be published by summary.

Ms. Parsons provided a second reading of **Ordinance 2022-03: Amending the Number of Tree Commission Members**. Mayor Hehman asked if there was any discussion. Hearing none, Ms. Boerger made a motion to approve Ordinance 2022-03. Mr. Stoeckle seconded the motion. Mayor Hehman calls for a roll call vote. Motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Parsons read **Resolution 2022-04:** Acceptance of ARPA Funds. Mr. King stated that the latest ARPA guidance allows for cities to claim a standard revenue loss and then the recipient can use these funds on general government services. Many other cities that are receiving less than \$10,000,000 are also adopting this resolution. Mr. Deatherage made a motion to approve Resolution Order 2022-04 as read, and Mr. Pohlgeers seconded the motion. The mayor called for a voice vote and the motion passed with all ayes.

Ms. Parsons read Municipal Order 2022-02: Approving the Appointment of Chrisanthy Zowtiak to the Tree Commission. Mayor Hehman asked if there was any discussion. Mr. King stated that Ms. Zowtiak lives off Beechwood Road and moved to Fort Mitchell because of the mature trees. Hearing none, Ms. Nachazel made a motion to approve Municipal Order 2022-02. Mr. Stoeckle seconded the motion. Mayor Hehman called for a voice vote and the motion passed unanimously with all ayes.

MAYOR'S REPORT

- Mayor Hehman read Executive Order 2022-05 Surplus Property. Several items are to be auctioned off on GovDeals.com. Mayor asked the portable radios to be given to Kenton County Detention Center, because they are still on the old frequency. Ms. Boerger made a motion to approve Executive Order 2022-05 as read and Ms. Roeding seconded the motion. The mayor called for a voice vote and the motion passed unanimously.
- The original roof is about 30 years old and continues to leak. The cheapest bid received for the roof repair was \$140,000. The money will probably not be spent till the next fiscal year. Mayor Hehman is looking for authorization to go ahead and sign the contract for the new roof and the monies will be added into the budget and will be approved in June. Mayor Hehman asked if there was any discussion. Hearing none, Ms. Burns made a motion to authorize the Mayor to sign the roof contract. Ms. Roeding seconded the motion. Mayor Hehman called for a voice vote and the motion passed unanimously with all ayes.
- The City Employee and Volunteer Appreciation Dinner was held last weekend and Assistant Chief Jansing celebrated 50 years of service.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

DEPARTMENT HEAD REPORTS

City Clerk Treasurer, Amy Guenther

- Fourteen property tax liens have been sent to the attorneys to be filed for 2021
- Three foreclosures have been sent to the City Attorney, Claire Parsons to be filed. Two other foreclosures of Fort Mitchell residential property have been filed by banks.
- No other department heads had a report.

CITY COUNCIL COMMENTS

- Ms. Boerger stated that the Wall of Honor ceremony will be held the second Saturday of September on even years going forward. This year the ceremony will be held September 10, 2022, and the last day for nominations will be Friday July 29th at 4:00 p.m. The Wall of Honor started February 1999. The committee selects 1-3 of the people nominated based on their service to the City.
- Mr. Pohlgeers recognized Chief Fuller since he was responsible for the City receiving \$1.500,000 in grants for the City since 2004 and \$960,000.00 since 2020.
- Ms. Burns stated that the City is hosting the seniors for bingo on March 15, 2022, 2-3:30 p.m. Also, Happy St. Patrick's Day!

Mr. Pohlgeers moved to go into executive session pursuant to KRS 61.810(1)(c) discussions of proposed or pending litigation against or on behalf of the public agency. Ms. Roeding second the motion and Mayor Hehman called for a voice vote. The motion carried with all ayes.

So we're massing the single-family residential homes up on the buildable area. So the open space is below these. It's the

trees that lead down to the creek.

And what I brought up in my argument

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to the planning commission, the planning commission
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      was requiring or wanting more active open space, is
      that we are right across the street from a
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      brand-new -- well, brand-new renovated park which
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      the residents will use. I also am providing active
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      open space down on top of the detention basin.
